The Future of the Qualified Guide

Recently we announced that there will be some changes coming to guiding qualifications across the board for all guides in the tourism sector of South Africa. This has caused some concern and has led to many questions about current qualifications, historical qualifications, and future qualifications. We are committed to maintaining open, honest, and accurate communication with our members to ensure there is no misinformation on this process.

We are having three open Information Sessions to update you all on the coming changes, the work that has been put into this process so far, as well as the road ahead for people looking to build their careers in guiding.

These changes are being driven by the National Department of Tourism

(NDT), the <u>Culture, Art, Tourism, Hospitality, and Sport Sector Education and Training Authority</u> (CATHSSETA), the <u>Quality Council for Trades and Occupations</u> (QCTO), and <u>South African Qualifications Authority</u> (SAQA).

FGASA has been engaged by all these bodies as a key role player in tourist guide training and we have been working closely with these as well as other organisations and industry stakeholders to map the road ahead for future guides. We are excited about the positive changes this will bring to the tourism sector in terms of guide training and recognition for guiding as a respected and legitimate career path.

We do also, however, understand the uncertainty this is creating in terms of the qualification process. We are hosting three open Information Sessions for all our members, interested parties, guide employers, and industry stakeholders to attend. The purpose of these sessions is to disseminate accurate information, mitigate the spread of false information and ensure that everyone knows what the future of guiding holds. While we are still waiting for the finalisation of the framework, we want to be proactive in our approach to communicating with you and put your questions, concerns, and minds at ease.

Once the qualifications process and framework has been finalised it will be published for public review and input. We will update as soon as this becomes available for your feedback. From there a final review process will take place where public concerns will be addressed prior to the finalisation of the new qualifications. So, you will have the opportunity to give your input into this process directly. We do not have all the answers yet as this is still in the mapping and scoping process, but we will give you all the information we have so far.

We look forward to seeing and engaging with you at the information sessions. Please come prepared with your questions.

For anyone unable to attend one of these sessions we will be recording them and uploading them to our social media platforms and our website so you will be able to watch and obtain all the information you need. Our doors are always open, and we welcome you to reach out to us via email, social media, call us or pop into the office.

FGASA Scout and About

The FGASA Scout Qualification is the highest Tracker level obtainable with FGASA. You can only earn this prestigious accolade by being a qualified FGASA SKS DG Trails Guide (Special Knowledge and Skills: Dangerous Game) and the Senior Tracker level certificate.

Having either one of the qualifications is a huge achievement in and of itself as both require years of hard work, practice, study and experience to achieve. The FGASA SKS DG Trails Guide certificate requires a minimum of 1200 hours of walking in high-profile animal areas, a minimum of 600 encounters with the DG category animals, passing a specialised Advanced Rifle Handling shoot and completing a rigorous assessment on trail in a high-profile animal reserve.

The <u>CyberTracker</u> Senior Tracker certificate is equally challenging to achieve. To obtain any Tracker level a candidate needs to complete both an animal Track & Sign assessment as well as an animal Trailing assessment. Track & Sign tests the ability of the candidate to recognise and accurately identify various animal tracks as well as specific signs these animals leave behind such as feeding patterns, dung or scat, territorial markings...etc. The Trailing component tests a candidate's ability to follow the tracks and signs left behind by an animal to locate it. Candidates are scored on both their Track & Sign as well as their Trailing abilities, these two scores together result in a Tracker certificate.

To reach the Senior Tracker level candidates must score 100% in both the Track & Sign and Trailing assessments at the lower band. This results in the candidate receiving the Professional Tracker certificate. Candidates are then invited to the Senior assessments where their knowledge and skills are put to the ultimate test. Candidates who score 100% on the senior assessments are then awarded the Senior Tracker certificate.

Once a candidate has obtained SKS DG Trails Guide status and the Senior Tracker level, they are then awarded the FGASA Scout certificate.

This year we welcomed two new FGASA Scouts, Andrew Kearney and Wayne Te Brake. Both Andrew and Wayne have years of practical experience, and theoretical study. They have completed numerous Track & Sign and Trailing assessments at the senior level, spend thousands of hours on foot in the bush and have dedicated themselves to their careers. Their hard work has more than paid off by looking at their incredible achievements. Both exceptional guides stand as excellent examples of the time and work you put into your career.

We would like to congratulate and celebrate both of you and the immense work you have put into your careers!
